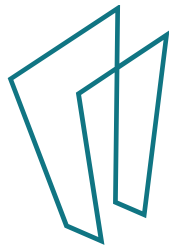

# Texts

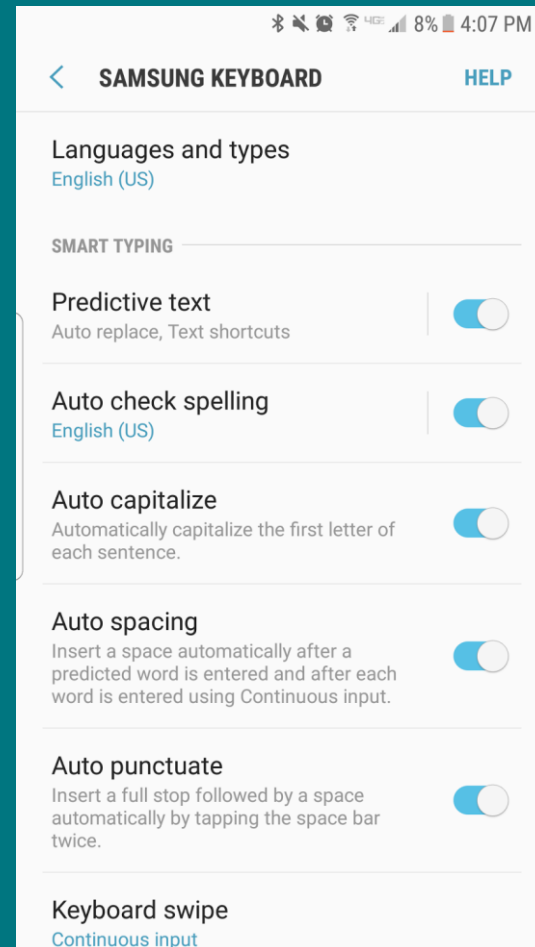
- 160 character phone message between two or more people
- Use when you have a quick message to share like “I’m here”
- When it’s hard to hear or you can’t talk on the phone

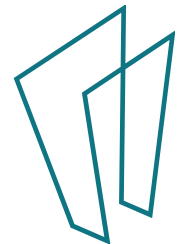
- Find the icon that looks like a gear

# Where is the Texting app?



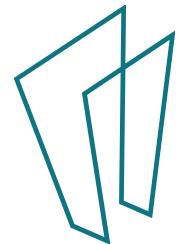
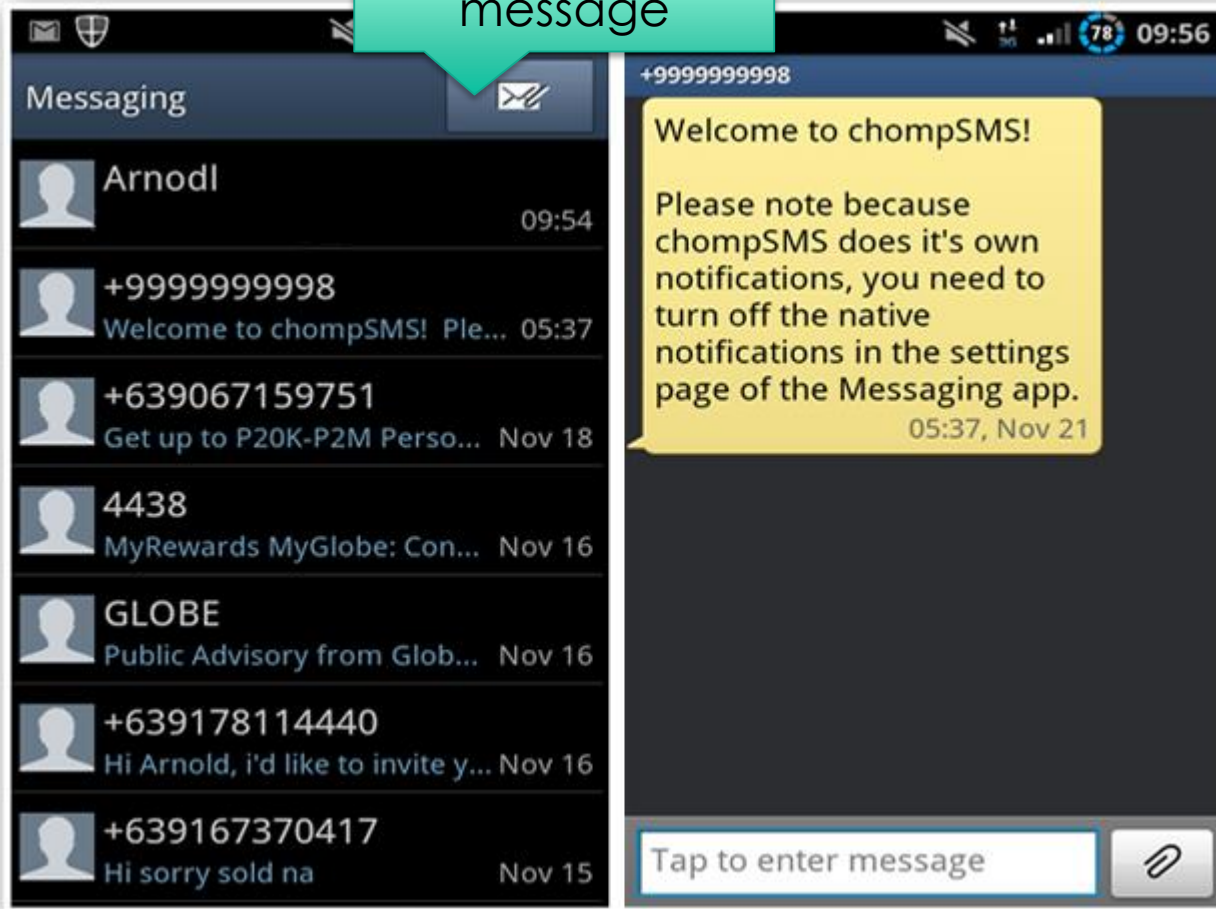
If you receive text messages, there may be a number next the icon that indicated the number of unread messages



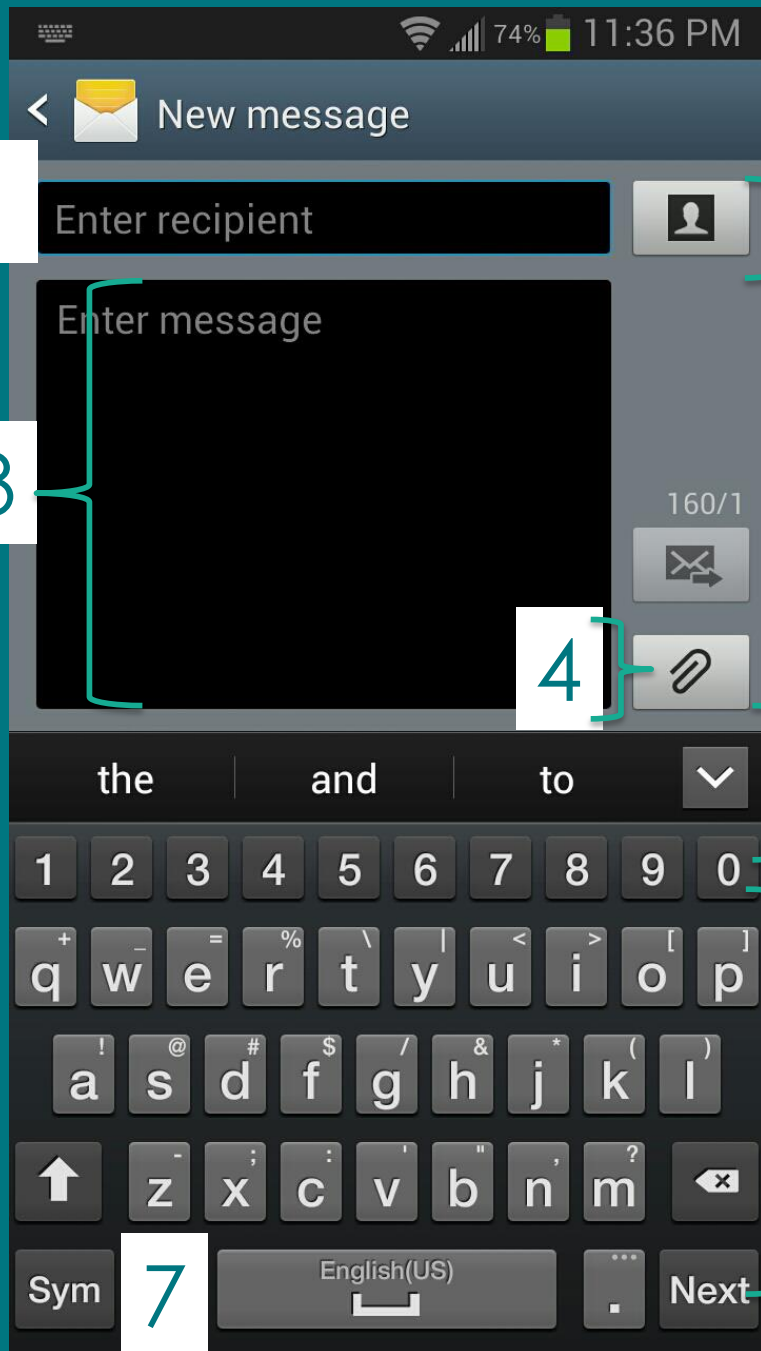
# Opening the message app

Conversations



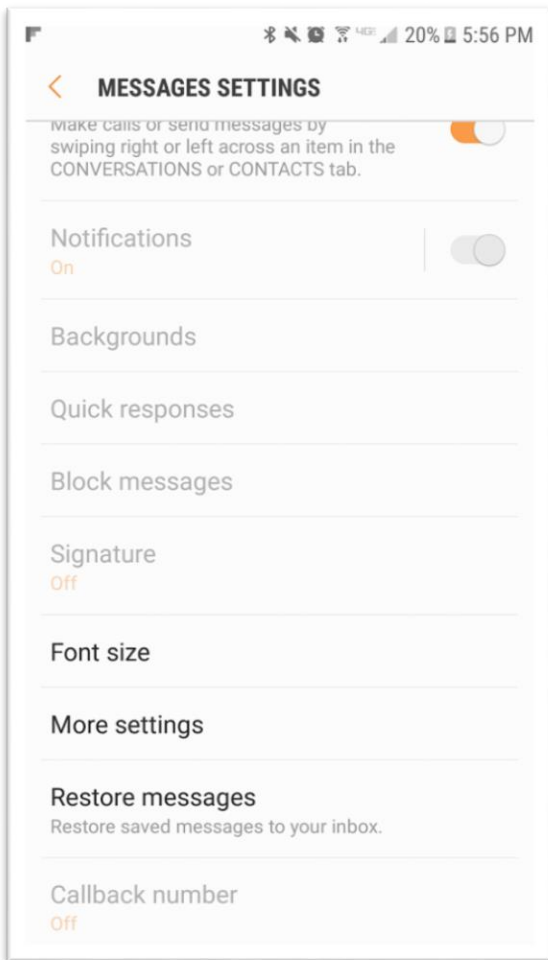
# Standard Texting Screen



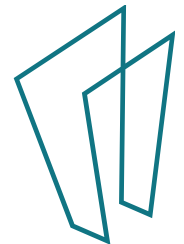
1. Who the text is going to (can be multiple people)
2. Select recipient from contacts
3. Enter the body of the message
4. Include an attachment
5. Autocorrect or suggested words
6. Your keyboard
7. Change to get symbols and punctuation

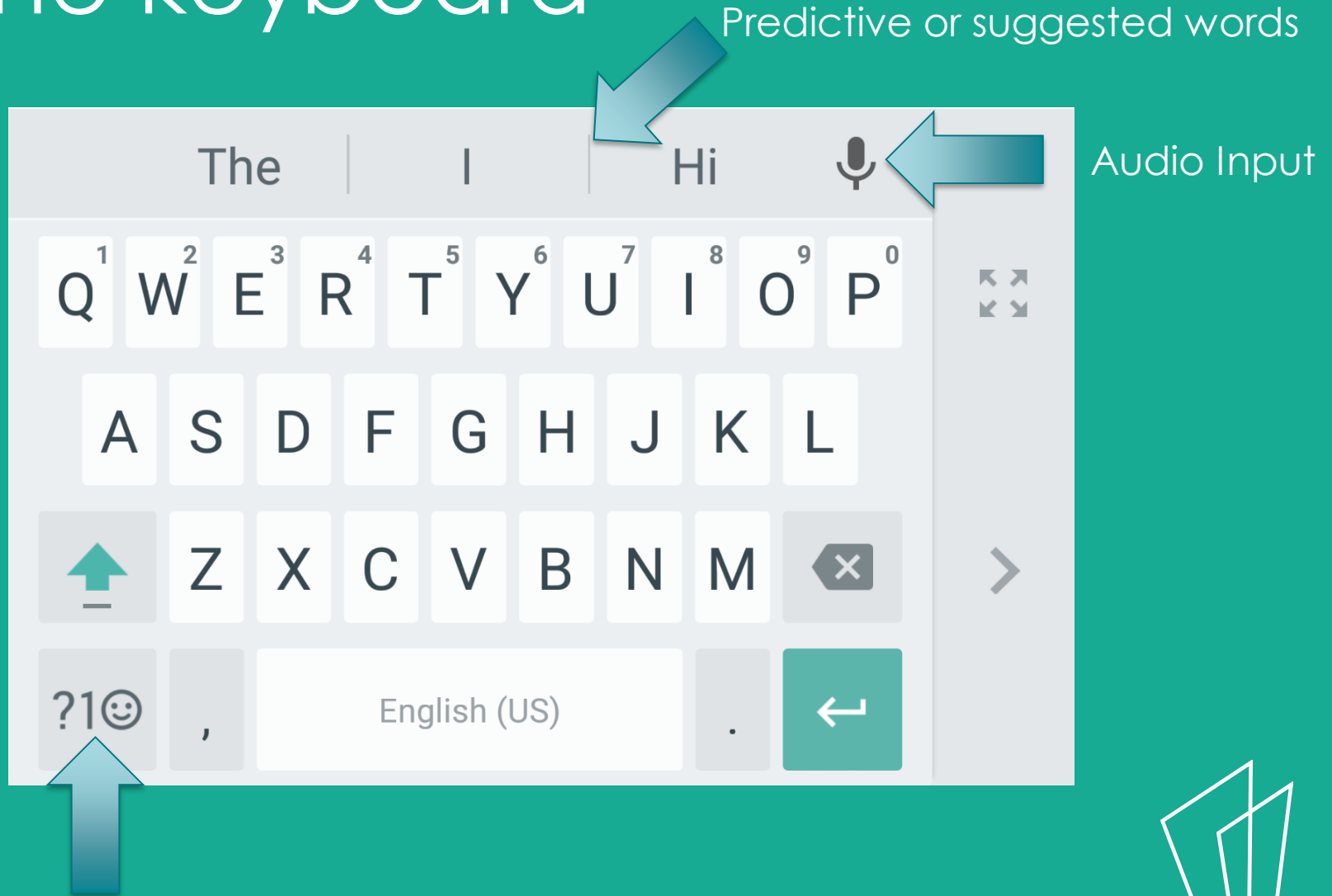

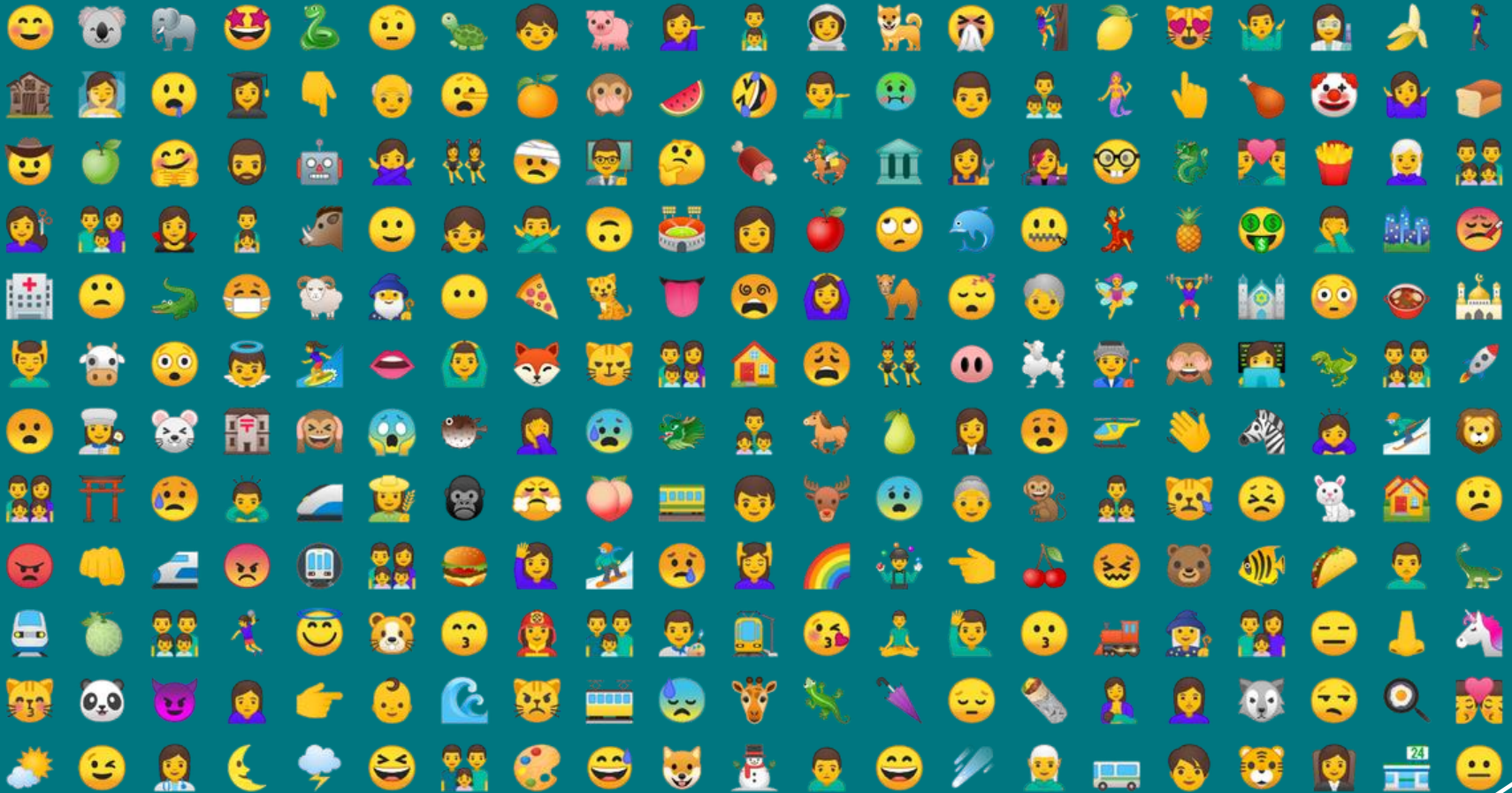
